

# CELEBRATING DEBBIE VINOCUR'S IMPACT ON BETH TIKVAH

There is much we can learn from Moses about leadership. When the rabbis wonder why God chose Moses to lead the Israelites, they share a story about him as a shepherd in the wilderness looking after his flock. One of the sheep wandered away from the flock, and Moses ran after it. He came upon it and found it drinking water from a pond. Moses picked up the sheep and carried it back to the flock, saying that if he had known the sheep wanted water, he would have led the flock there to quench its thirst. The midrash then teaches us that God chose Moses as a leader because of his compassion, knowing that if he could be so compassionate with sheep, he could do so with God's people.

When God wanted to destroy the Jewish people after the incident with the Golden Calf, Moses pleaded with God to save the people, saying, "Why would you lead this people out of Egypt, only to destroy them in the wilderness? What would other peoples of the earth say about you?" The rabbis picture Moses taking God by the collar and pleading on their behalf. From this, we learn that Moses was willing to stand up for the people despite all their imperfections.

Later, in the book of Numbers, we learn that Moses was the humblest man on all the earth. Through his humility, he could recognize God's presence and the importance of sharing leadership with the elders. As we can see from Moses, leadership requires that we have many and diverse qualities. A year ago, Debbie Vinocur, our esteemed Executive Director, marked 10 years of service to our congregation. We acknowledged this moment on Yom Kippur but had to delay the celebration that was initially planned for the fall. We are excited to celebrate and honor Debbie's 10 years (now really 11) of service to our congregation on Friday evening, August 16th. At Congregation Beth Tikvah, we have been blessed with stable staff leadership for more than a decade. Such longevity is not common in synagogue life today. Debbie brings incredible dedication to her work, balancing the financial, physical, staff supervision, security, and membership needs of the congregation. Debbie is often the first face that people meet as she welcomes new members, offers them a tour, and helps them get situated at Beth Tikvah. She has become a leader and expert among her colleagues in managing the diverse security needs of a congregation, as she has written and received government grants for hundreds of thousands of dollars to upgrade our security needs. She leads our staff each day, and when congregants knock on her door, she greets them with a cheerful smile.

I have often believed that the Executive Director position is the most challenging in the entire synagogue. The Executive Director does not often lead from the front and does not always get public accolades. I hope you will join us on Friday evening, August 16th, as we honor Debbie during Shabbat services and celebrate with a special oneg in her honor. Mazel tov, Debbie! We are so grateful that you have led us for this past decade plus!



# TISHAH B'AV: A TIME FOR REFLECTION & RENEWAL

Tishah B'Av, observed on the ninth day of the Hebrew month of Av, is traditionally a day of mourning that commemorates the destruction of the First and Second Temples in Jerusalem. These tragedies, along with the other calamities that befell the Jewish people on this date, make it one of the saddest days in the Jewish calendar.

Many Reform Jewish communities teach that Tishah B'Av is less about dwelling in sorrow and more about reflecting on the lessons these events teach us today. The destruction of the Temples was not only a physical loss but also a symbol of the end of an era and a call to spiritual reflection. It reminds us of the dangers of baseless hatred and division within our communities.



In contemporary practice, we may not strictly adhere to all traditional customs of mourning, such as fasting or sitting on low stools. Instead, we might focus on meaningful reflection, engaging in discussions that explore the historical and ethical dimensions of the topics. We can talk about themes of loss and resilience and consider how we can contribute to building a more compassionate world.


Tishah B'Av serves as a reminder of the enduring spirit of the Jewish people.

# A SUMMER OF LEARNING: ENHANCING OUR JEWISH EDUCATION

I have had a busy summer of learning, and I am excited to share what I have been up to! During my Sabbatical in June, I had the amazing opportunity to refresh my Modern Hebrew skills through an incredible online course with Hebrew College in Boston. It was so awesome to be a student again and learn from an incredible instructor. Not only did I gain spoken language skills, but I also learned new teaching techniques which I am excited to share with our Adult Hebrew learners. I highly encourage anyone interested in learning Modern Hebrew to check out their offerings!

In July, I attended two incredibly impactful webinars:

- 1.The Jewish Federations of North America have been hosting trainings in partnership with <a href="The Blue Dove Foundation">The Blue Dove Foundation</a> and Selah to educate as many Jewish professionals about the opioid crisis as possible. Through this learning, we were trained to recognize the signs of an overdose and use Narcan. We learned that the highest population seeing a spike in overdose are seniors, something that was surprising to me.
- 2.I got the opportunity to learn with the incredible Nachama Moskowitz, one of my mentors from my early days in my career in Cleveland, about the work the Jewish Education Center is doing surrounding Hebrew learning. I am hopeful that we will be selected to participate in a Community of Practice to continue this work.

As of this moment, I am writing to you from the NewCAJE conference in San Diego! It has been an incredibly meaningful experience gathering with diverse educators during this unique and challenging time for the Jewish people. One thing that makes NewCAJE special is that it draws folks from all denominations of Judaism, and all types of educational programs (synagogues, adult learning centers, day schools, camps, universities and more!). Some highlights include attending sessions on increasing communication skills, creating engaging t'filah for young learners, and many sessions on Israel education and confronting antisemitism. I also was blessed to offer my first ever workshop at a conference, where I shared about incorporating meditation and mindfulness within the Religious School classroom and beyond. I'm happy to share my slides and resources with anyone who might be interested!

Later this month, Alisa and I will be attending a training through the STAR program OSU about addressing trauma. Through this experience we will learn strategies for how to recognize, empathize, intervene, and support others who may be struggling or suffering. We recognize the importance of this work currently as we are still in a period of extreme stress and trauma for our global Jewish community.

Our Religious School staff will gather with colleagues from around the community for three professional development sessions this month, in addition to our own Beth Tikvah-specific teacher training.

We are thrilled to once again be presenting a robust learning experience for our teachers in partnership with my colleagues in JEOrg, made possible through a grant from JewishColumbus. Our teachers will be learning storytelling techniques for teaching Jewish text with the incredible Jonathan Chapman, taking a deep dive into Israel education with the iCenter, and staying up to date with the latest best practices for inclusion and behavior modification with Hanna Fotsch, Community Disabilities Inclusion Coordinator. With our hearts and minds enriched through these experiences, we are so looking forward to welcoming our students back in September!

LUTHERAN SOCIAL SERVICES MISSION (one of the largest homeless shelters in Columbus) needs new men's L and XL flip flops for residents when they shower.

BISHOP GRIFFIN RESOURCE CENTER (a food pantry and free store that helps those facing systemic poverty with tools, resources and services) needs gently used: shoes for men, women and children; household items like hand can openers, drinking glasses, pots and pans, bath towels, wash cloths and kitchen towels.


I SUPPORT THE GIRLS, Columbus affiliate, (a network of affiliates that collects and distributes essential items to women and girls experiencing homelessness, impoverishment, or distress, and distributed through schools, shelters, pantries, street outreach programs, reentry programs, new moms, refugee programs, human trafficking and domestic violence programs, cancer programs, hospital sexual assault programs and medical outreach programs) needs new individually sealed menstrual hygiene products, new or lightly used bras, new underwear and socks, new travel or full size soap, lotion, shampoo, conditioner, deodorant, and wipes, make-up bags, perfume, toothbrushes, toothpaste, floss, mouth wash, combs, brushes, and hair ties.

DRESS FOR SUCCESS (provides women with tools for success through workforce readiness and employment retention programs, mentoring, career center and wardrobe assistance) needs clean professional interview and employment apparel, jewelry, scarves, belts, handbags, totes, footwear, seasonal outerwear, new hosiery and under garments.

MAGLITERACY (provides donated new and good quality children's and adult consumer magazines about all subjects and comic books at no cost to literacy programs and programs serving at-risk readers in order to add value to programs already dedicated to eliminating illiteracy and poverty) needs gently read magazines and comics for adults or children in clean "good" condition with no cut, torn, or scribbled covers or pages and no moisture damage. Magliteracy will mark out your mailing label or you can do this yourself with a permanent marker. Do not cut out the mailing label.



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

# TORAH TRAILBLAZERS: CELEBRATING REMARKABLE JEWISH WOMEN RABBI REGINA JONAS

Rabbi Regina Jonas may very well be one of the most significant women in Jewish history, but her efforts were only discovered in the 1990s when her documents were found in Theresienstadt. Let's back up a little. Jonas was born in Berlin, Germany, in 1902. Her father died when she was only ten years old, but before his death, he instilled in her a passion for Judaism. Jonas began talking about becoming a rabbi in her early teenage years, so her mother enrolled her in a weekly class where she could expand her studies in Torah, Talmud, and rabbinic literature.

Her interest in Jewish studies led her to
Hochschule für die Wissenschaft des Judentums,
also known as the Higher Institute for Jewish
Studies, where she was the only woman working
to become an ordained rabbi. Jonas wrote her
thesis on why women should be able to hold
rabbinic office, but her professors still denied her
eligibility. She was able to graduate as a religious
school teacher until 1935, when she officially
became the first woman to be ordained as a rabbi.
Her groundbreaking ordination by Rabbi Max
Dienemann marked a pivotal moment in Jewish
history, challenging long-standing gender roles
within the culture.

Following her ordination in 1935, Jonas served as a pastoral rabbinic counselor and worked at welfare institutions and Jewish hospitals. During the start of the Nazi regime and the first events of Kristallnacht, Jonas cared for sick and elderly patients. While most Jews were fleeing the country, Jonas stayed in Germany and provided spiritual support and sermons for her suffering community. Documents found in Theresienstadt in the late 1990s provide records of Jonas and her mother being deported to the concentration camp in November 1942. Jonas and her mother remained there for two years as she served as a rabbi and continued spreading light to dim the pain and darkness felt by Jews during the Holocaust.



In October 1944, Jonas and her mother were deported to Auschwitz, and it is believed they were both murdered within a day or two of arriving at the camp. Her yahrtzeit is usually marked annually during the week when Parshat Breishit is read.

Congregation Beth Tikvah's Yom Kippur prayer book, the Mishkan Hanefesh, highlights Rabbi Jonas and her accomplishments, "Jonas gravitated to those in need – the ill, the elderly. Perhaps because of her empathy, and her belief in the intrinsic value of every life, she clung to an optimistic worldview that integrated spirituality, theology, and service to others, even in the midst of the gathering storm," (Central Conference of American Rabbis, 2015).

Despite the challenges and societal barriers she faced, Jonas' determination to become a rabbi broke significant ground for women in Judaism. Her work during the Nazi regime highlights her extraordinary courage and compassion; the rediscovery of her documents in the 1990s has brought to light the profound impact she has had on Jewish history. Rabbi Jonas' story is one of resilience, innovation, and humanity, three of the largest pillars of the Reform Jewish Movement. May her story continue to be told so that her legacy can inspire future generations.



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
