Facing the New Year Together

Words from Rabbi Rick Kellner

There is so much emotion built up with the arrival of this new year. Everything we do is seen through the lens of October 7th. The High Holy Days are filled with hopes and wishes for a new year, but at the same time, the feeling is muted as 101 hostages held labvrinth remain in the underground tunnels in Gaza. Nearly 100,000 Israelis are displaced from their homes in the north of Israel, and the communities of the Western Negev are going through the long process of rebuilding. As I exchange emails with friends, their safety and security are top of mind as the threat of war with Hezbollah escalates each day.

With all these emotions weighing on our hearts and souls, we face the new year with deep questions about who we are and what we are striving to become. This past year has challenged us as a people. We have been challenged externally by the many enemies seeking to destroy Israel and by rising antisemitism at home and around the world. We have also been challenged internally as we struggle to make sense of the complexities of the ongoing war confronting the Israeli people every day. I, too, have struggled to make sense of it all, and there are times I've wondered what the way forward might look like.

I will also say that this past year has deeply challenged me personally. For so many years, I was raised with the idea that Tikkun Olam was an essential value of Jewish life. It was core to my identity. In the past year, I have reflected on Rabbi Hillel's three questions: "If I am not for myself, who will be for me? If I am only for myself, what am I? And if not now, when?" Over the years, I have emphasized the second question, which turns us outward towards serving the needs of others.

But what about the first question—what about us?



Have we, as a Reform Jewish community, solely emphasized Tikkun Olam and helping others without truly taking care of ourselves? It is certainly possible. I think this is a moment in which we need to find balance. How can we deepen our own knowledge of our story and sacred texts? Inherent in our texts are great questions about how we live our lives. They guide us in our interactions with one another and offer us opportunities to build our character.

These questions have led me to want to spend more time thinking about who I am as a Jew: What does it mean to celebrate Shabbat? Why should I build a sukkah? What is the importance of passing tradition on to my children? I want to immerse myself in the incredible canon of Jewish texts-Biblical, Rabbinic, and modern. How have you wrestled with similar questions this past year? What is your connection to the Jewish people? In what ways can you dive deeper into Jewish tradition? As we ponder these questions as individuals, let us also do so together over the next few weeks and months as we engage in questions answerina these community. I want to wish everyone a Shanah Tovah. May we find moments of joy and health in the year ahead, and may we soon be able to celebrate the safe return of the hostages.







Jewish women in Central Ohio have a Giving Circle, the Tzedakah Collective. Now in its 11th year, our goal is to help restore human dignity in underserved populations by giving grants to local worthy non-profits that do excellent work. Funds have helped - feed the homeless, teach life skills to young adults who have Autism and Downs Syndrome, provide essential goods for homeless teenagers, improve parenting skills to teenage parents, teach low income children to raise vegetables, help young, single mothers and their children move out of dangerous living environments, assist immigrants to resettle, provide prenatal care to low income high risk pregnant women, provide scholarships to abused women who return to college, provide reentry programs to trafficked women, give bikes, helmets and supplies to foster children, support families who have experienced perinatal loss, provide healthy food in underserved zip codes.... These are just a few examples of how the Tzedakah Collective has helped those in need in our community.



The next featured non-profit is Stockhands Horses for Healing "provides equine therapeutic services to children and adults living with mental, physical and emotional challenges arising from a wide range of diagnoses," including PTSD, ADHD, Autism Spectrum Disorder, anxiety, developmentally disabled learning and behaviorally challenged learning; and provides special outreach programs for Veterans and First Responders.



Torah Trailblazers: Celebrating Remarkable Jewish Women

BELLA ABZUG

This month's Torah Trailblazer, Bella Abzug, was a fierce advocate for justice, equality, and peace-values that resonate deeply with Reform Judaism and Congregation Beth Tikvah. Known for her bold leadership and activism, Bella fought tirelessly for women's rights, civil rights, and nuclear disarmament, shaping a legacy that continues to inspire.

Born to Russian Jewish immigrants in 1920, Bella's sense of justice and determination guided her career as a labor lawyer and later as one of the most influential voices in Congress. Elected in 1970, she championed the Equal Rights Amendment, environmental protection, and social justice causes. Bella co-founded Women Strike for Peace, advocating for nuclear disarmament during the Cold War, a pursuit that echoes the Jewish value of preserving life.

At Congregation Beth Tikvah, we uphold the same pillars of tikkun olam (repairing the world) and social justice that Bella embodied. As the High Holy Days are now just less than two weeks away, we are called to reflect on our roles in creating a better, more just world.
