

# A Season of Turning

Words from Rabbi Rick Kellner

n a season of turning, we wonder how our hearts turn. So much of our time is outwardly focused on trying to please others. Seldom do we take the time to reflect on our lives, our values, our decisions, or our actions. Maybe, every year we think about such themes on a birthday. Or perhaps in our professional lives, we consider such questions on the anniversary of starting work or perhaps at the conclusion of a cycle of our work. Judaism gives us an entire season to consider the direction that our lives are taking, what direction they should take, and if we have missed the mark, how we return to the path we hope to take. We revisit this season annually; this moment is the time for us to begin the process of our cheshbon hanefesh, an accounting of our lives with both a critical compassionate eye.

Towards what should our hearts turn? Our rabbis invite us to reflect on the moments in our lives that have challenged us and they also encourage us to think about the times when we have done well and brought light and blessing to the world we encounter. As we count our errors, can we count our blessings as well? While in this season we knock on our hearts to open them up to these errors, we also turn our hearts towards the light of Torah.

Such work is difficult, and this past year has raised profound questions about what it means to live Jewishly. We have been challenged by so many questions ranging from the tension of universalism versus particularism. Many of us have stood up for people, especially those who are marginalized, and we have wondered where they were for us in our moment of need?

We have been haunted by the images and stories we have heard from the survivors of October 7th and the hostages who have returned home. We have been challenged at home because of the virulent antisemitism that is rising all around us. For parents and grandparents of our college students, we fear that they cannot live the lives we hoped for them.

Sometimes, there is only so much pain and complexity we can hold in our hearts. The politics and the narratives befuddle us. With all that in mind, where can our hearts turn? Perhaps they need to turn to love. How can we perceive our neighbor in such a way that invites us to see their humanity? How can we see our fellow Jewish people suffering? When we express our love for them with word and deed, we strengthen Jewish Peoplehood.

This is a season of turning. As the month of Elul begins on September 4th, we start this process of turning. It happens day by day and step by step. We can turn a whole world in a moment, but the pivot we need to make takes time. The journey happens through reflection, learning, and thoughtful planning for the future. Sometimes those plans go unfulfilled, but we give our best selves and we do all we can. And when we fail, we offer ourselves self-compassion and forgiveness.

Rosh HaShanah begins on October 2nd, let the Shofar's blast push our hearts to turn towards love. Debra, Zoe, Shira, and I wish you all a Shanah tovah um'tukah, may we turn from a year of sorry to one where we encounter moments of joy and sweetness.

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WORDS FROM MORISSA R. FREIBERG, RJE

Last month, I shared about my opportunity to take part in a webinar series this summer with the incredible Nachama Moskowitz, one of my mentors from my early days in my career in Cleveland. She is the former Director of the Jewish Education Center of Cleveland (JECC). During this learning, she shared about the work she is doing surrounding Hebrew learning. Soon after, I applied to take part in a new Community of Practice (CoP) through Nachama's organization OnwardHebrew. I am so excited to share that we have been selected to take part in this group! This CoP is focusing specifically on the theme of "Conquering the Challenge of Hebrew Decoding", and will help me as Director and our teachers gain valuable insight into ways we can best work with our Hebrew learners and their families. One aspect of this work will include creating a Beth Tikvah Hebrew teacher CoP where we

will engage in reflective conversation guided by the work and research of Onward Hebrew. I will also be participating in a four-session national CoP with other education directors/Hebrew that supervisors are working with educatortheir own experimenter teams. We will choose new teaching strategies that we are interested in piloting/testing, specifically ones that easily mesh with the challenges they face in their current teaching assignments. Our teachers will gather multiple times to share results and reflect together on individual findings which might also result in newly discovered teaching strategies, and determine next steps on how to implement these innovations in our Hebrew learning program. We are also blessed with a \$500 grant from Onward Hebrew for participating in this program, which will be used to compensate our amazing educators for this additional work.

# A NEW CHAPTER: BETH TIKVAH BEGINS SEARCH FOR AN ASSISTANT RABBI

Words from President Ted Fons



I'm pleased to report that the Board of Trustees has made excellent progress on the process of bringing a new Assistant Rabbi to Beth Tikvah.

To summarize our progress so far:

During the 2023-2024 Board year, a trusted task force explored the needs of our congregation, Rabbi Kellner's current workload, and the financial feasibility of adding an assistant rabbi to serve the congregation.

The Task Force's work was fruitful and in its April, 2024 meeting, the Board of Trustees approved the creation of a Search Committee to begin the search process through the Central Conference of American Rabbis' (CCAR) rabbinical hiring process.

Liz Shafran, who has experience with rabbinical searches, agreed to chair the Search Committee and the work started in June of 2024. The Task Force's last assignment was to work with Liz on putting together a search committee that represents the diversity of Beth Tikvah's membership.

The Committee is now hard at work compiling a profile of our congregation and preparing all of the materials that the CCAR requires to post the job for candidates in the early fall.

The next steps are to finish that work, then we'll post the position with the CCAR and begin the selection process. We expect to interview candidates later this year and begin the selection process. If the Committee finds a candidate that matches our needs, then it will recommend that candidate to the Board for approval.

New Rabbis typically begin their contracts on July 1, so if the process is successful, we can expect a new Assistant Rabbi to begin serving the congregation on July 1, 2025.

# A Legacy of Remembrance:

# The Rosenthals' Commitment to Holocaust Education

In the heart of Congregation Beth Tikvah, the Rosenthals have found their spiritual home for nearly four decades. Maria and Steven Rosenthals' enduring connection to our community reflects their deep commitment to Jewish values, particularly in the realm of Holocaust education. Their dedication has led to the establishment of the Martin & Marian Rosenthal Legacy Fund for Holocaust Education—a tribute to Steven's father, a Holocaust survivor whose experiences have shaped their mission.

The Rosenthal family's story is one of resilience, memory, and the unyielding drive to ensure that the horrors of the Holocaust are never forgotten. Steven's father survived Kristallnacht, yet the trauma he endured left permanent scars. In a video recording from 1988, Steven's father recalls the events of Kristallnacht. He remarks, "the popular saying, 'time heals all wounds,' does not work for me." The weight of these memories, too painful to fully share, leaves gaps in the family's history, but the Rosenthals are determined to honor what they do know and to keep the legacy alive.

For Maria and Steven, the Martin & Marian Rosenthal Legacy Fund is more than just a commitment—it sacred financial is responsibility. "There has to be a legacy. There has to be a memory of them. Otherwise, much," there's not Maria expressed, emphasizing the importance of remembrance. The fund is designed to make Holocaust permanent education a fixture community, extending its reach beyond the walls of Beth Tikvah to schools and public institutions where the lessons of the Holocaust can be shared with the broader community.

"Beth Tikvah is a community where people come in and find themselves, grow, and then contribute. It's evolving," Maria said.

This evolution, grounded in generational continuity, is at the core of the Rosenthals' vision. They see their legacy not just as a preservation of the past, but as a bridge to the future, ensuring that the lessons learned from history continue to inform and inspire future generations. "It's not something that comes from the outside," Maria emphasized. "It's something that we have to build."

Through the Martin & Marian Rosenthal Legacy Fund, Maria and Steven have ensured that the story of the Holocaust—along with its critical lessons—will continue to be taught for generations to come. Their hope is that by supporting Holocaust education, they can help others "learn to detect that manipulation" that leads to such atrocities. "We need to find ways to get people's eyes on these things," Maria urged.

As we reflect on the Rosenthals' contributions, we are reminded that the work of building and sustaining our community is ongoing. "Today it is us, in the present day. Later it will be the people who are just now coming in. It's not something you preach, you understand by seeing how it looks and how it feels," Maria reflected. Their legacy fund is a testament to the power of memory and the importance of ensuring that the lessons of the past continue to shape our future.

In creating this fund, the Rosenthals have given our community an invaluable gift—a promise that the memory of the Holocaust will endure, and with it, the commitment to preventing such tragedies in the future. "That's what a legacy is; we're not going to be here forever, but in a way, we can be here forever." Through their generosity and vision, the Rosenthals have made it possible for Beth Tikvah to keep the flame of remembrance burning bright, ensuring that we never forget.

# PROTECTING OUR HOME: SECURITY TRAINING AT BETH TIKVAH



Beth Tikvah is more than just a congregation; it's a home we share, and our security measures are designed to keep it that way.

We extend our deepest gratitude to Steve Flowers for sharing his expertise with us and working tirelessly to ensure our safety. Steve has also provided us with PowerPoint presentations from the training sessions. We encourage everyone to review these materials, as they contain valuable information that could be crucial in an emergency. Come speak to Debbie Vinocur or Hannah Karr about how you can access these PowerPoints. Keeping informed and prepared is key to maintaining the security of our shared home.

Security is one of our top priorities here at Congregation Beth Tikvah. Last month, Steve Flowers led two vital security training sessions at our congregation. The first session, "Active Shooter Response," equipped congregants with the skills to assess and respond during an active shooter crisis. Survivors of attacks at both the Tree of Life Synagogue in Pittsburgh in 2018 and the Colleyville, Texas Synagogue in 2022 have credited this type of training with saving their lives. In the second session, "Be Aware," Flowers taught us how to identify potential threats and take appropriate action to mitigate them.

Training like this is essential for both congregants and staff, ensuring that we are prepared to act should the need arise.

## **COLUMBUS JEWISH FILM FESTIVAL CELEBRATES 20TH ANNIVERSARY**

Much has changed in the last 20 years with the Columbus Jewish Film Festival, while much has stayed the same.

When founders Gigi Fried, Marjie Coopersmith, and Melva Schottenstein (z"l) met to plan the first festival, they could not have imagined that it would grow from five days to three weeks, or that it would expand citywide to include showings at the McCoy Center in New Albany, the McConnell Center for the Arts in Worthington, as well as stalwarts like the JCC and the Drexel Theatre in Bexley. Nor could they have realized over 30,000 people would attend.

The Columbus JCC has been committed to this program from the very beginning. Mike Klapper, JCC CEO, considers the Jewish Film Festival to be "an essential arts" initiative that aligns with our goal to deepen community engagement."

The founders would see their legacy continue with "topical, thought-provoking, entertaining, and educational movies," according to Emily Schuss, the festival's director for the last 18 years, while announcing the dates of this year's event. The 20th Annual Columbus Jewish Film Festival, a program of the JCC in celebration of Andrew Ethan Stern, will run from Nov. 3 through 24, 2024.

In this special anniversary edition of the festival, viewers can expect films that showcase dance, art, and music, as well as features that address interpersonal relationships and antisemitism, and much more. Additionally, there will be insightful guest speakers, new programming, and engaging receptions with delicious food.

As in its early years, the 2024 festival has three chairpersons to ensure this 20th edition is memorable. Paul Wolfson, one of the co-chairs, says, "We are going to showcase Jewish culture, Jewish film, and most importantly, Jewish identity. Can you think of anything more important right now?" Carol Glassman, a returning cochair who has served on the steering committee for 19 years, loves the festival because "We bring hundreds of people from different backgrounds and different religions together every year. And by sharing relevant, resonant films, we build bridges and deepen understanding.

Cheryl Dritz, a returning chair who was for many years the director of the Jewish Bookfair, likes that "films from around the world that you wouldn't normally see make you realize you share the same experiences as people in France, Israel, etc. Seeing these perspectives is eye-opening."

Committee members will be fundraising in the coming months for this anniversary edition of the festival and to endow a legacy for future film festivals. Now is the time for your organization, business, or synagogue to sponsor a film, become a patron, honor a special person, or plan a group outing.







# **Chai** 614

## Expanding Senior Support Through Community Collaboration

Chai 614 is a collaboration of six synagogues and two Jewish agencies working together to establish a citywide "age-in-place" village to support older Jewish adults in their own homes. A Beth Tikvah work group began studying the feasibility of a faith-based village two years ago. The group recommended inviting all of Columbus's Jewish institutions to be part of the model. Chai 614 is the outcome of the Beth Tikvah work group's vision. Senior volunteer leaders from Beth Tikvah, Beth Shalom, Temple Israel, Congregation Agudas Achim, Tifereth Israel, and Kehillah Sukkat Shalom, along with Columbus Family Services and Wexner lewish Heritage Village, formed a liaison group last year. This group has increased social and educational gatherings, similar to our Shishim programs, and opened these Jewish older adults programs to throughout the city. Additionally, these senior volunteer leaders are exploring patient advocacy support and a centralized older adult information and referral resource. They are working to establish a full-fledged village.



Another feature of village models that Chai 614 is undertaking is the creation of a vendor list of workers and companies (handymen/women, plumbers, painters, etc.) in the community who are reliable, honest, take pride in their work, and work well with seniors. The purpose of this Tikvah Topics article is to explain this benefit and to solicit your help in compiling such a resource. Today, there are seven established and operating villages in communities like German Village, Clintonville, the Short North, Arlington, the Near East Side, the West Side, and Marysville. Each is unique, but all maintain useful, valued vendor lists. These villages also recruit volunteers to perform simple household tasks that may be difficult for some senior home dwellers. Chai 614 hopes to recruit such volunteers in the future. At this time, I have a wonderful handyman, a great painter, and an outstanding lawn sprinkler system company. I plan to share the names and contact information for the proposed list that all our Chai 614 organizations are cataloging. Can you share the folks who reliably help you maintain your home? I hope so.

# TORAH TRAILBLAZERS: CELEBRATING REMARKABLE JEWISH WOMEN GERTRUDE B. ELION

Born in 1918 to Jewish immigrants in New York City, Gertrude Elion grew up with a deep sense of curiosity and a passion for learning. Her drive to understand the complexities of life led her to the field of chemistry, where she would groundbreaking contributions to the world of medicine.
